



In February the forest rested quietly. The snow covered everything in a cosy, insulating blanket, giving us time to listen to the subtle rhythms of life. We planned our activities for when spring appears, aware that things could change in a single day. Our rangers faced the cold, constantly patrolling to prevent illegal logging, more tempting in the colder periods.



It snowed, but is it enough?

The water level in Lake Vidraru was at an all-time low, so the ruins of the village of Cumpăna, which stand on this spot, became visible.












After sitting under the snow, the white fir saplings were unveiled as the sun began to shine. In total, there are 46,000 white fir seedlings in our nurseries ready to be planted in the mountains.

In the nurseries we have prepared the ground in which we will grow new seedlings as soon as the weather permits.

There will be a forest here again.

Since 2021, we have spent a lot of effort replanting at Groapele (a high-altitude area near the commune of Nucșoara) and now we can see on the ground that the forest is slowly recovering.

We don't know if the snow will allow us to plant here this spring, but we definitely know that we will continue our work to restore and preserve the forest.







We study wolves using urine samples, droppings and hairs.

In addition to this, we now have a new methodology that allows us to obtain cells from wolf tracks left in the snow. It is called Environmental DNA, DNA extracted from the environment.

The snow collected with a sterile scoop is melted and the resulting water is filtered and analysed in the lab to extract each wolf's DNA.







Our colleagues were joined by three volunteers (two from Germany and one from France). They were very helpful in collecting DNA samples.

The snow and the involvement of the volunteers were a great help: we obtained 230 classical DNA samples in February - close to our target of 250.

In addition, 12 samples were collected with the new method - Environmental DNA.







Apparently, Valentine's Day didn't really suit the two wolves, so they slept in separate 'rooms'.








We have captured five bison in Argeş county, to put collars on them – collars that allow us to track their movements via GPS. The data is helping us to better understand how the bison feed and move around in the Făgăraş Mountains!





'The apple doesn't fall far from the tree' also applies to deer. Mother deer and son deer observed by our colleagues in the field confirm this proverb.



In the Strâmba Valley, near Sinca Nouă, beavers are busy and are not intimidated by the thickness of a trunk.

Even if they seem a threat to the trees, the vegetation will regenerate. Nature has evolved with beavers and biodiversity flourishes where beavers are present.





The kitchen at the Cobor Biodiversity Farm was busy in February. The colleagues who take care of guests' meals attended a cooking workshop with chef Mihai Todea. We're gearing up to offer our guests not only sumptuous meals, but a more sophisticated local taste.












Easter preparations



At the foot of Piatra Craiului, in the Brusturet area, a new mountain rescue base has been inaugurated, essential for mountain rescuers from Muscel.

From here, rapid interventions will be more effective, especially in the summer season, when the number of tourists in the area is at its peak.

We supported this project by supplying the necessary wood, building the wooden roof and purchasing interior fittings.











In February we launched, together with Țara Făgărașului Community Foundation, the third edition of Carpathia Fund. Through this project we offer grants to NGOs, initiative groups and scholarships to students from the communities of Țara Făgărașului. We are waiting for the final application forms up tp 23rd March!





The movie 'Nature's Architects' is on tour! At the end of February, we started a series of screenings of the documentary about reintroduced species. In Sibiu the room was full, the attention was alert, and the questions amazed even our specialists in the reintroduction of bison and beaver! One snowdrop doesn't make spring. But more snowdrops mean more balance in nature.
